Arriving to Casa Campolattaro

Our local host is Vanessa with Lucca Travels.

**** Please message Vanessa at least 48 hours prior to your arrival. Arrival before 8 pm is preferred.**

Check-in time begins at 3pm. Check-in begins at 3:00 PM. Guests are asked to provide and confirm a 3-hour check-in window in advance. Arrivals outside of the agreed-upon window, or outside of the 3:00–8:00 PM check-in period, will incur a €20 fee, payable upon arrival.

Early check-in may be available - request with Vanessa prior to arrival. If you arrive before check-in time and need a place to store your luggage, there is a "Welcome Home" luggage storage place directly across the street on Via Galli Tassi. They are closed on Mondays.

The address of Casa Campolattaro is: Via S. Domenico 1. Our apartment is located in the building behind The Piazza della Magione. The entrance is on the side of the building. Vanessa will meet you at Casa Campolattaro at your pre-determined arrival time.

Even if you will have GPS in your rental car, we highly recommend printing these instructions. Many people arrive in Italy to find that their cell phones don't work as promised, so it's best to plan your route in advance of arriving in Lucca. A GPS system may take you into the restricted area of the city (or direct you down a one-way street) so please do not rely on it within the walls.



The door to enter our apartment is on the side of the building. When standing in Piazza della Magione (the parking lot in front of the building), it is on the right side. This is a private entrance, and no other apartments share this doorway.

Bed Configurations

We have flexible bed options in the living room and second bedroom. **Please be sure to let us know your preferred bed configurations prior to your arrival.**



Arriving by Car



Parcheggio Citadella Is the nearest lot to Casa Campolattaro. It's just steps away.

You can enter Centro Storico via Porta S. Anna on Vittorio Emmanuel. You can unload your belongings at the apartment and then go and park your car. There are a number of pay and free lots both inside and outside of the walls.

Please note: *the parking directly in front of our building in Piazza della Magione is for residents only. You can unload bags from there if someone stays in the car.*

Parcheggio Carducci, just outside Porta Sant'Anna - 539 parking spaces

Hourly rate: € 1,00/h; Daily rate: € 8,00; Minimum rate :€ 0,50 (30 minutes)

Opening hours: everyday from 8:00 until 20:00. Maximum daily rate € 8,00. Free overnight parking

For longer stays: Go to: www.metrosrl.it. This website will explain the requirements for obtaining a long-term parking pass for Lucca. It's not necessary to fill out the forms prior to arriving at the Carducci Office, but could save you some time in advance. After arriving in Lucca, proceed to the Carducci Parking Lot. You'll see a building/kiosk where they will issue you a permit. They are open Monday to Friday from 0830 to 1330 and Saturday from 0830 to 1230. On the form, check Citadella as your selected parking lot. Be sure to bring with you photocopies of your car's registration and your driver's License/IDP. They will not copy these items at their office. The cost will be 50€ for one month and you can pay with a credit card. You can renew this parking pass card at the automated machines for a longer period as long as you don't let it expire. They will give you a card that you will use to enter/leave the lot (Do not take paper tickets).

Free Parking is available outside the walls

- Look for spots with WHITE lines, indicating free parking in the areas outside the walls.
- Piazzale Don Franco Baroni - same place where bi-weekly market is held.
- Outside the city walls; short walk into the center.
- Can be crowded on market/fair days. Avoid leaving valuables visible.

Buses

Taking the bus is an affordable and reliable option for airport transfers.

Piazzale Verdi is Lucca's main bus hub, located just a few blocks from Casa Campolattaro. From Piazzale Verdi, local buses serve nearby neighborhoods and villages, while regional buses connect to cities like Pisa, Florence, and Viareggio.

It is also a common drop-off point for parking shuttles and tour buses, since non-resident cars and coaches cannot enter the restricted traffic zone.

The ticket office is located in the building next to where the buses park. Lucca offers intercity bus connections to more than 13 cities in Italy like Rome, Turin, Genoa and many others. <https://getbybus.com/en/bus-from-lucca>

Driving & Parking



IMPORTANT: Only residents of Lucca can enter into the ZTL (Zona Traffico Limitato), but Casa Campolattaro Is located just prior to the (very clearly marked) ZTL. Check out our [blog on navigating ZTL](#).



= STOP! DO NOT Drive Here.

Download the Easy Park App. It's a lifesaver when you don't have change or the meter won't take your card. Plus, It allows you to add more time to your meter from afar.



This PAID parking lot (Parcheggio Cittadella/Manifattura) is located only a block from Casa Campolattaro. This Is the ideal spot to park in while staying with us.

Parking spots are painted different colors to indicate If it is paid, only for residents or free. This is true across all of Italy.

- Blue stripes - paid parking
- Yellow stripes - residents only, or handicapped parking (DO NOT park here)
- White stripes - FREE parking



The parking lot directly in front of our building has recently been converted to resident-only parking.

For longer stays: Go to: www.metrosrl.it. This website will explain the requirements for obtaining a long-term parking pass for Lucca. It's not necessary to fill out the forms prior to arriving at the Carducci Office, but could save you some time in advance.

The cost will be 50 euros for 1 month and you can pay with a credit card. You can renew this parking pass card at the automated machines for a longer period as long as you don't let it expire.

Arriving by Train from Pisa Airport

To travel from Pisa Airport to Lucca Centro by train, you'll first need to take the Pisa Mover shuttle from Pisa Airport to Pisa Centrale train station. Here's a breakdown of the process and the approximate cost:

1. Pisa Mover: The Pisa Mover is an automated people mover that connects Pisa Airport (Galileo Galilei Airport) to Pisa Centrale train station.
 - Cost: The fare for the Pisa Mover is typically around €2.70 for a one-way ticket. You can purchase tickets from the ticket machines at the airport or online in advance.
2. Train from Pisa Centrale to Lucca Centro: Once you arrive at Pisa Centrale train station via the Pisa Mover, you can catch a regional train to Lucca Centro.
 - Cost: The cost of a one-way train ticket from Pisa Centrale to Lucca Centro is approximately €3-€5, depending on the type of train and whether you purchase a first or second-class ticket.
 - Train Schedule: Trains from Pisa Centrale to Lucca Centro run frequently throughout the day, with departures approximately every 30 minutes.

To use the Pisa Mover:

1. Upon arrival at Pisa Airport, follow the signs to the Pisa Mover station.
2. Purchase your ticket from the ticket machines located at the station or use a contactless payment method.
3. Board the Pisa Mover, which will take you directly to Pisa Centrale train station.
4. At Pisa Centrale train station, proceed to the ticket counters or ticket machines to purchase your train ticket to Lucca Centro if you haven't already done so.
5. Check the departure boards for the next train to Lucca Centro and proceed to the appropriate platform.
6. Board the train and enjoy your journey to Lucca Centro!

Please note that schedules and fares may vary, so it's a good idea to check the latest information closer to your travel date. Additionally, ticket prices and train schedules can change, so it's always a good idea to verify the details before your journey.

How to Get to Lucca Centro Storico from Pisa Airport by Train



Follow the Signs for Pisa Mover

After exiting baggage claim, look for signs pointing to "Pisa Mover," the automated shuttle train that connects the airport to Pisa Centrale station. It's a short, well-marked walk, just a couple minutes from the terminal exit, though you'll need to climb a short staircase (or find the elevator) to reach the platform level.



Buy Your Pisa Mover Ticket(s)

Head to the automatic ticket machines at the Pisa Mover station, where a one-way ticket costs around €5 to €6.50. You can pay by card or cash, and tickets are valid for a set window from purchase, so no need to rush.



Ride the Pisa Mover Shuttle

Board the Pisa Mover, which takes about 5 to 8 minutes to reach Pisa Centrale train station. It's automated and driverless, and you'll want to keep your luggage close since storage space on board is limited.



Arrive at Pisa Centrale and Buy Your Ticket to Lucca

The Pisa Mover drops you at Pisa Centrale. From here, head to the Trenitalia ticket machines or ticket office and purchase a ticket to Lucca. Important: unlike the Pisa Mover, regional train tickets must be validated before boarding, look for the small green validation machines near the platform entrances and insert your ticket to stamp it with the date and time. Skipping this step can result in a fine even if you have a valid ticket.



Find Your Track, Board, and Arrive in Lucca

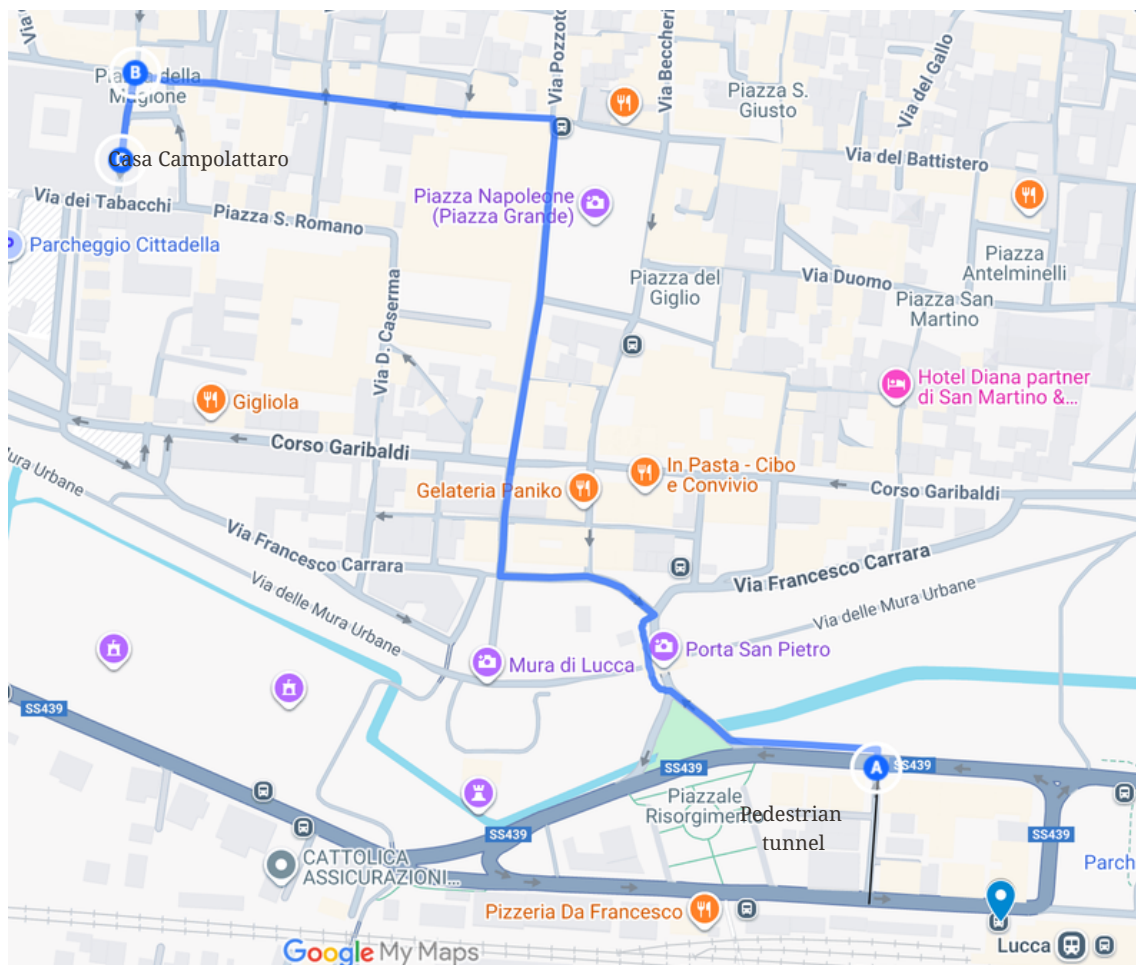
Check the departure "Partenze" boards for your train's "binario" (track #). Follow the signs to your platform and board the train to Lucca, a ride of about 25-30 minutes. Once you arrive, exit the station and use the pedestrian underpass to safely cross the busy road out front, this tunnel pops you out right across from the city walls, where you can walk through one of Lucca's historic gates directly into the walled city center.

Walking to Casa Campolattaro from the Train Station

We are a 12 minute walk from the Lucca Train Station. Click on the map below to be taken to a Google map. If you have a lot of luggage, taxis are available in front of the train station.

Walking Directions:

- Take the pedestrian tunnel immediately across from the station
- When you come out of the tunnel continue straight on Viale Regina Margherita
- Slight right onto Piazzale Umberto I
- Enter Lucca's walls at Porta S. Pietro and bear left
- Turn right onto Via Veneto
- After you pass Piazza Napoleone (Piazza Grande), turn left onto Via Vittorio Emmanuele
- Pass the cinema on your left
- Turn left onto Via San Domenico at Piazza della Magione
- The entrance to Casa Campolattaro will be on your left, on the side of the building
- You've arrived!- Via S. Domenico, 1



Trains

Trains are the simplest and most affordable way to reach Lucca, with frequent daily connections and easy access to the historic walled city.

Lucca Train Station (Stazione di Lucca)

Address: Piazza Ricasoli, 55100 Lucca

- A short walk from Porta San Pietro and the historic center (2 blocks).
- Connections to Florence, Pisa, Viareggio, and other Tuscan towns.
- Amenities: Taxi stand, ticket machines, restrooms, café.
- Website: www.trenitalia.com

Booking & Tickets

- Use the Trenitalia website or app for easiest booking.
- Tickets are also available at station machines.
- Regional trains have no assigned seating.
- Paper tickets must be validated in the stamping machines on each platform.
- Digital tickets are automatically validated.
- Validation is good for 6 hours; fines apply if not validated.

Station & Lines

- 5 platforms; end-point of Pisa–Lucca and Lucca–Aulla lines; stop on Viareggio–Florence line.
- Only regional trains serve Lucca.
- Station has a ticket office, restrooms, a small shop, and a café.
- Local buses stop nearby; daily bus to Pisa airport available.

Travel Times from Lucca

- Florence: Fast train ~80 min (recommended), slower stops ~1h 45m. Trains leave hourly.
- Pisa: ~15–20 min
- Viareggio (beach): ~20 min
- Pistoia: ~45 min
- Montecatini Terme: <30 min
- Cinque Terre: Via Viareggio or Pisa; change for La Spezia/Genova.
- Pisa Airport: Train to Pisa Centrale, then transfer to Lucca.
- Florence Airport: Bus (~30 min) or taxi (~€25) to Santa Maria Novella station, then train to Lucca.

Tips & Notes

- Only validate the ticket in use, not your return ticket.
- Watch arrival/departure boards for delays or platform changes.
- For high-speed trains, tickets are dated and seat-specific—no validation needed.

Arriving by Bus

There is a bus that leaves the Firenze airport and goes directly to Lucca. The bus station is located in Piazzale Verdi, inside the city walls, just about 2 blocks from Casa Campolattaro.

- Among the Tuscan cities that are connected to Lucca by bus, there is Florence, Pisa and Viareggio. The bus company is named VaiBus. Rides are going to take you a bit more than trains, so it may be easier to get to town by train. <https://lucca.ctnord.it/>

Taxis & Private Drivers

Taxis are typically available at:

- The stand directly in front of the train station.

- Piazzale Verdi (near buses)
- Otherwise, it is very rare to catch a cab on the side of the street, so calling ahead of time to arrange for a ride is recommended. Hotels, restaurants, and bars will be happy to call for you.

Local Transportation

Lucca is easily reachable both by car and public transport, thanks to its position on the main highways and railroad lines that connect Florence to Pisa and Viareggio.

By Car

The old center of the city is closed off to traffic - and many of the areas that do allow for cars are exclusively reserved to residents. So once you get here, you need to park outside the walls. There are a few parking areas inside the walls but be sure to read the signs and look for indications that it is parking open to everyone.

- Lucca is located on the highway A11 Firenze - Mare, that road which connects Florence with Pisa and the Versilia Coast. If you're coming from either the North or South, you need to take A11 and exit at Lucca Est or Ovest.
- If you're coming from the coast, on the highway A12 Genova - Roma, you will first connect at Viareggio then proceed to Lucca Ovest and use a faster road called Bretella (there is a toll to be paid on A11 and a12).
- If you're coming from the Pisa or Florence airports and have a rented car, follow indications to A11 in both cases. Both Lucca highway exits are located about 1 km from the city center.

Bikes

The city is small and flat so it is easy to navigate, but bikes allow you to cover more ground quickly. Lucca is known for being a bike-friendly town: there are many bike-reserved areas all over the city and there's no local who lives in Lucca who doesn't have a bike! **We provide two bikes for your enjoyment while staying at Casa Campolattaro.** Be sure to always lock the bikes! Bikes should be stored in our loggia when not in use. When out and about, always lock up the bikes. DO NOT ride your bike on the crowded shopping street, Via Fillungo, as you may be fined.

Should you need more than the two bikes provided, you'll find plenty of affordable hourly and daily rental bikes both outside and inside the city walls, especially at many of the access to the ramparts, We recommend: Amici Bici (just behind our building on Via della Cittadella) or Chrono Bikes or Cicli Rai. Rates run @€3 per hour to @€20 per day.

Tips for Dining in Italy

- **Closures** – Many restaurants are closed on Sunday and/or Monday, so plan ahead.
- **Reservations** – During high season (April–October), weekends, and special events, reservations are strongly recommended. A place may even appear empty yet still be fully booked. Reservations can often be made online via The Fork app or by stopping by in advance.
- **Dining hours** – Lunch is typically 12:30–2:30 pm, and dinner usually begins around 7:30–8:00 pm (later than many visitors expect). Many kitchens close between lunch and dinner service.
- **Seating** – Don't seat yourself. Wait to be greeted and shown to a table, even if the restaurant looks quiet.
- **Service** – Meals are generally relaxed and unhurried. Don't expect the check to arrive automatically; when ready to leave, ask for it with "Il conto, per favore."
- **Coperto** – Most restaurants charge a small per-person fee (coperto) for bread, table setting, and service. This is normal and not a scam.
- **Tipping** – While still appreciated, tipping is not obligatory in Italy. Locals might leave small change or round up the bill, but it's never expected the way it is in the U.S.
- **Bar etiquette** – Bars and cafés often charge more for table service than for standing at the counter. If you want a quick coffee, it's cheaper to order at the bar and drink it standing.

Where We Would Eat

If we only had a week in Lucca Centro

From cozy trattorias in hidden alleys to elegant bistros on lively piazzas, Lucca is full of endless options. Fair warning: attempting to follow this itinerary exactly might leave you needing to be rolled onto the plane—good thing all those steps exploring Lucca help balance it out. Also, "Con diviso" (divided) is a helpful phrase which allows you to try more things without overindulging!

We're not food critics, just food lovers who've done plenty of "research." If we only had one week in Lucca, here's where we'd eat—no particular order...

Day 1:

Breakfast: Caffè del Teatro - Neapolitan pastries in a welcoming environment at Via S. Girolamo, 6

Lunch: Trattoria Da Giulio - Traditional Lucchese cuisine with beautiful outdoor seating at Via delle Conce, 45

Aperitivo: L'Angolonove - Quellocale- Funky vibe on the piazza with live music on occasion - Piazza Cittadella, 9

Dinner: Osteria da Pasquale - Extremely friendly owner and staff with extensive variety of vino. Corte Morovelli, 4

Dessert: Gelateria Anfiteatro - in Piazza Anfiteatro

Day 2:

Breakfast: Pasticceria Dianda - Cappuccino and numerous pastries at Via S. Paolina 93

Lunch: Da Ciacco - Panini, salads and charcuterie boards (no pizza or pasta, which they'll remind you of every time you go!) at Piazza Napoleone 10

Aperitivo: Enoteca Vanni - Amazing wine selection. Be sure to check out the cellar! P.za del Salvatore, 7

Dinner: Osteria Miranda - Excellent service and inventive menu for a special occasion. Via dei Carrozzeri, 27

Gelato: I Gelati di Piero - Artisan gelato including several unique flavors. Via Roma 5





Day 3:

Breakfast: Pasticceria Taddeucci - Taste the infamous sweet Buccellato bread where it was invented at Piazza San Michele, 34

Lunch: Strabuono - The best street food outside of Naples at Via Buia 2

Aperitivo: Franklin 33 - Speakeasy vibes and cocktails at Via S. Giorgio, 43

Dinner: Buca di S'Antonio - Tuscan Michelin-recognized cuisine at Via San Paolino near Piazza S. Michele

Gelato: Momo Gelati - Piazza della Magione, 1

Day 4:

A Few Notes...

- **Breakfast**, often a simple affair consisting of a quick espresso or cappuccino accompanied by a pastry, is typically enjoyed between 7:00 AM and 9:00 AM. Bars, integral to Italian social life, open early in the morning to cater to locals seeking their morning caffeine fix.
- **Lunch**, considered the day's main meal, typically occurs between 12:30 PM and 2:00 PM, allowing ample time for indulging in multiple courses and leisurely conversation. Italians prioritize fresh, locally sourced ingredients, often enjoying a midday repast composed of antipasti, primo (first course), secondo (second course), contorno (side dish), and dolce (dessert), accompanied by wine and followed by a leisurely passeggiata, or post-meal stroll.
- **Dinner**, typically a lighter affair, is served later in the evening, usually between 7:30 PM and 9:00 PM, (although locals seem to arrive @8:15pm) offering another opportunity for culinary exploration and socializing with loved ones. These cherished dining rituals reflect Italy's rich culinary heritage and its reverence for food as a source of nourishment, pleasure, and connection.

Daily Needs

One of the best parts of staying in Lucca is enjoying the abundance of fresh, local products—from fragrant bread and cheeses to seasonal fruits and vegetables, locally cured meats, and of course, Tuscan wine. Here are a few tips to help you shop like a local:

- **Tap water** – The tap water in Lucca is safe, fresh, and delicious. The city is blessed with mountain water delivered by aqueduct, and there are 22 old-style fountains scattered throughout the Centro Storico where you can refill bottles for free. Bring a reusable water bottle and enjoy! We provide our guests with glass refillable bottles.
- **Store hours** – Most small grocers and shops are closed on Wednesday afternoons and all day Sunday. Many also close mid-day for pausa (roughly 13:00–15:30), and nearly all close for the night around 19:30–20:00. Plan your shopping trips accordingly.
- **Markets** – Weekly outdoor markets are a wonderful way to experience local life and find fresh produce, cheeses, meats, clothing, and household goods at good prices. Ask around for the schedule—they’re held in different parts of the city.
- **Specialty shops** – You’ll find dedicated butchers (macellerie), bakeries (forni), and delicatessens (alimentari) throughout the historic center. These are often the best places to source regional specialties.
- **Supermarkets** – Larger grocery stores are located both inside and just outside the walls, offering wider selections and longer hours. They’re convenient for basics but don’t skip the smaller shops for authentic flavors.
- **Payment** – Credit cards are widely accepted, but some small shops still prefer cash, especially for smaller purchases.
- **Shopping bags** – Bring your own reusable bag (borsa) or be prepared to pay a small fee for one at checkout. We provide several for our guests.

Biking In Lucca



We are happy to provide 2 bikes for you use in Centro Storico while staying with us. Should you need additional bikes for family members there are several options nearby. Lucca is a big biking town, so there are numerous shops that rent bikes in the historic center:

- **Amici Bici** (meaning friends/bicycles) - Conveniently located around the corner at Via Cittadella, 28. Rates start at 5 Euro an hour or 20 Euro for a full day. They offer special rates for multiple days. They also offer road bike rentals should you want to explore beyond the walls.
- **Chrono Bikes** - Corso Garibaldi, 93
- **Cicli Rai** - Via San Nicolao, 66
- **Bike Sharing** - The town now offers bike sharing via the app Ridemovi. Bikes can be usually found near the Tourism office.

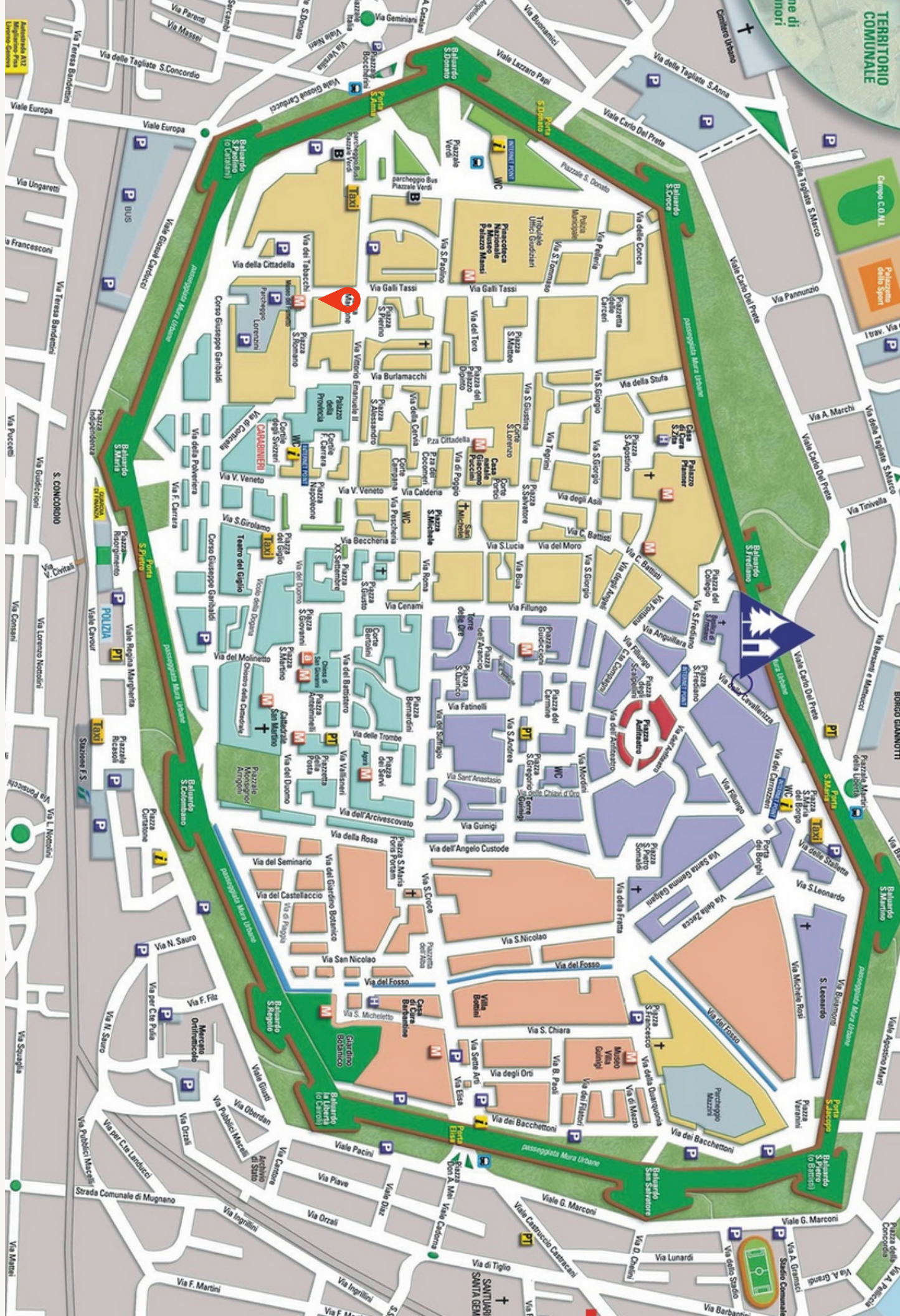
Lucca's historic city walls form a 3-mile greenway loop around the city, with a wide, flat, tree-shaded path perfect for year-round riding. The walls offer traffic-free cycling, views over rooftops and surrounding hills, picnic spots, cafes, benches, water fountains, and a playground. The path can get busy in the evenings when locals take their "passeggiata," so riding during these times is not recommended.

Do not ride your bike down Via Fillungo or other heavily-traveled pedestrian areas during peak tourist hours.

ALWAYS lock the bikes.

Lucca Is very safe, but bikes do get stolen.

Please DO NOT lock our bikes at the train station for the day.

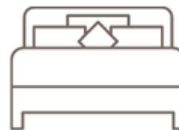
Clean up spills and crumbs quickly.
